Water aerobics is a moderate to intense aerobic exercise in the water that will give you all the great benefits of a cardio workout with some muscle conditioning and strengthening without the impact on the joints you get from traditional land aerobics. It is a flexible class that allows you to work at your own pace. All exercise is done in shallow water with no swimming required. Participants must wear swimsuits. Participants will have use of a locker in the Student Recreation Center, but will need to bring their own locks.


Four Levels of Wonder

Explores the role of inquisitive wonder in helping children discover what's "real". Considers the wonder of worldly uncertainty that we all experience. Touches on how awe can be linked to wonder. Examines the importance of a special kind of wonder as adults ponder "what's next" at the end of life.

Dr Scott is a Terre Haute native who attended Schulte HS, then Vanderbilt University and Vanderbilt Medical School. His career as a physician-scientist (cancer research) started at the National Institutes of Health and included many years at the Mayo Clinic.



A Glimpse at the Great Depression and Dust Bowl

The Dust Bowl intensified the crushing economic impacts of the Great Depression and drove many farming families on a desperate migration in search of work and better living conditions. This class serves as a precurser to the Steinbeck *Grapes of Wrath* Class.

In the first session, Michelle will give a brief overview of the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl for a better understanding of the historical context of the period in which the *Grapes of Wrath* was written. The second session will feature excerpts from *Ken Burns: The Dust Bowl* video.

Ken Burns: The Dust Bowl

The Dust Bowl chronicles the worst man-made ecological disaster in American history, when a frenzied wheat boom on the Southern Plains, followed by a decade-long drought during the 1930s, nearly swept away the breadbasket of the nation.





To Kill a Mockingbird: Revisiting the Book and the Film

Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird* tells the story of Scout Finch, a young tomboy, whose developing relationships with her father Atticus, her brother Jem, and other assorted characters emerges against the backdrop of a race-related trial in the fictional 1930s Macomb, Alabama.

The novel is more than a book about race, however; instead, it is a book about learning, including both lessons that are actively taught and those that are learned through observation and experience. The richness and variety of these lessons about family history, region, religion, class, race, gender, relationships, respect, empathy, and honor—make this a novel worth exploring over and over again.

The first three sessions will concentrate on the 1960 novel; in the final sessions, we will view the 1962 film and discuss the ways in which Robert Mulligan transforms the powerful novel into an equally powerful film.

You must purchase the book separately. Any edition of the book is fine, but the larger format editions are easier to read because of better printing and wider margins.

Steinbeck's: The Grapes of Wrath

Following October OLLI classes describing The Great Depression and the Dust Bowl, two OLLI classes in November deal with John Steinbeck's novels *To a God Unknown* (1933) and *The Grapes of Wrath* (1939). The



classes examine the sequential and thematic experiences of Southern Plains families forced to abandon their farms and join the migration westward. Participants will study the symbolism and the impact of these two novels. Discussion will include examination of the views of some critics that Steinbeck may have plagiarized portions of *The Grapes of Wrath* from the works of Sanora Babb, a young lady who, along with her family, experienced the great human diaspora westward, as described in her 2002 book *Whose Names are Unknown*. Participants will view the 1940 film *The Grapes of Wrath*.

Participants will be requested to read *The Grapes of Wrath*. In-depth synopses and reviews of the other two novels will be presented during the class. Reading of the additional two novels by participants is optional.

Prague: a Little Geography, a Little Mystery, a Little Travel

Join other OLLI members for a three session class all focused on Prague. One session with Mike will discuss the geography and social, economic, and political conditions existing in Prague and the Czech region during the early 17th-century, the period involved in the intriguing 2017 mystery novel *Wolf on a String* by Benjamin Black.

Another session will be with Elmer discussing the mystery book *Wolf on a String* by Benjamin Black. Prague, 1599. Christian Stern, a young doctor and student of the occult and paranormal, has just arrived in the city in quest of becoming a member of the entourage of the eccentric and downright weird ruler Rudolf II. On his first evening, he finds a young woman's body half-buried in the snow. The dead woman is none other than the emperor's mistress, and there's no shortage of suspects. Stern is employed by the emperor himself to investigate the murder, plus a second murder that may or may not be connected. Stern finds himself drawn into the shadowy world of the emperor's court – unspoken-of affairs, letters written in code, and bitter rivalries.

The third session will be with Michelle focusing on the sights to see in Prague, sights that play a significant role in the novel. We will view Rick Steves' Europe episode on Prague as well as video on the history and origin of Prague.

Steinbeck's *In Dubious Battle* and "Was Steinbeck a Plagiarist?"

Two classes will examine the 2002 Sanora Babb novel *Whose Names are Unknown* and the 1936 Steinbeck novel *In Dubious Battle*. Discussion will pick up following the somewhat abrupt and controversial ending of *The Grapes of Wrath*. Participants will gain insight into what likely happened to the novel's protagonist Tom Joad as he went off to his life of organizing ill-treated migrant farm workers by studying the experiences of the *In Dubious Battle* protagonist Jim Nolan. The presenter will discuss adversarial tactics which the presenter observed during his thirty years of experience in dealing with labor-management relations and strife in the North American coal industry during the mid- to late-twentieth century. Participants will view the 2016 film *In Dubious Battle*.

During the November 22 class, a famous Steinbeck scholar will participate in the session discussing the plagiarism accusations, which she addressed in her newly-released 2021 book. The discussion promises to be an "eye-opener" for participants who may have earlier read any of the Steinbeck "Dust Bowl Trilogy" novels.

Human Rights in Central Asia

This presentation will introduce us to the human rights situation in Central Asia and challenges us to think critically about the causes of



and solutions to human rights violations. Areas that will be explored include: gender rights; labor and employment rights; rights in the justice system; children's and family rights; educational; cultural and religious rights; national and ethnic minority rights; and freedom of expression and the media.

Identity, Nationality, and Ethnicity in Central Asia

We will learn about how the concepts of identity, ethnicity, race, and nationality were constructed in the Soviet Union and China and applied to Central Asia. Embedded in the program are discussion questions about how identity and nationality are constructed in our everyday lives.

Italian immigrants of the late 1800s and early 1900s found their way to Clinton in search of work in coal mines and seeking the enjoyment of opportunity and freedom promised in letters from earlier arriving relatives and friends.



OLLI members, guided by immigrants and descendants of immigrants, will visit the Immigrant Statue and the "Piccola Casa", an actual quaint immigrant family home furnished with original household items used by early immigrant families. Stops will include the "Mercato", featuring items from shops and stores operated by some of the immigrants, and the old train station where many immigrants arrived, which contains "Coal Town" housing memorabilia from the early mines and an accurately reconstructed "face" of an underground coal mine, including the "canary in a cage".

"Pranzo" (lunch) at the nostalgic Gerrie's Restaurant on North 9th Street will feature sausage made by an Italian immigrant and recipes of foods brought from the "Old Country", recipes which were discussed in the OLLI Regional Italian Cooking class.

Enjoy an included tour of Melk Abbey, originally a lavish castle that was gifted to Benedictine monks during the 11th century. Upon arrival in Dürnstein, you can choose time at leisure to wander through this enchanting village, or hike to the ruins of Dürnstein Castle where Richard the Lionheart was held prisoner. Alternatively, for a different perspective, stay in Melk and join a guided bike ride from Melk to Dürnstein.

DAY 8 Vienna: Welcome to Vienna, Austria's capital and the capital of classical music. The city perfectly encapsulates the opulence of the Habsburg Monarchy and their ornate Baroque Danube Explorer Dürnstein, Austria – The 'Pearl of the Wachau Valley' Vienna's Imperial Hofburg palaces. On the included city tour, see monuments and grand buildings as the coach drives along the famous Ringstrasse. Alternatively, embark on a guided hike to Bratislava Castle, a landmark steeped in legends that looks as though it came from the pages of a fairytale book.




Facing Injustice . . . Lynching in America and On the Banks of the Wabash

Being misidentified as the perpetrator of a heinous crime is what nightmares are made of. It is a nightmare that became all too real for Ronald Cotton.

In 1984, an assailant broke into the apartment of a young college student, Jennifer Thompson. She was brutally raped. Cotton was first identified as the assailant in a photo lineup and then again by Thompson in a live lineup. He was ultimately convicted and given a sentence of life in prison, plus 54 years. After multiple unsuccessful attempts to overturn his conviction, the Burling Police Department turned over all evidence for DNA testing. He was cleared of all charges and pardoned in July 1995, after serving ten years in prison.

Upon his release, Cotton and Thompson formed an unlikely friendship, founded on the healing power of forgiveness. Together, they co-authored The New York Times best-selling memoir *Picking Cotton*—soon to be a major motion picture directed by Jessica Sanders.




